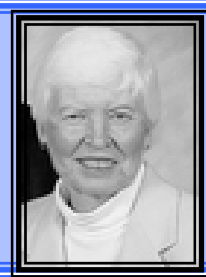

LIFELINE: IS THIS FOR YOU?

Lifeline is a medical alert service. A medical alert service can help independent older adults and individuals with chronic medical conditions feel more confident to continue living independently in the one place they feel most comfortable-their own home.

ASK YOURSELF THESE QUESTIONS:

1. Are you alone for several hours during the day and/or night?
2. In the past year, have you fallen or been afraid of failing in your home?
3. Have you been hospitalized or been to the emergency room in the past year?
4. Do you have at least one of these chronic ailments: heart disease, stroke, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, osteoporosis, diabetes, or arthritis?
5. Do you use a cane, walker, wheelchair, stair climber or other assistive device to help with balance or walking?
6. Are you required to take several daily medications?
7. Do you require assistance with at least one of the following activities: bathing, toileting, dressing, meal preparation, etc?
8. Would a medical alert provide peace of mind for you or your loved ones?
9. Is it important to you to continue living independently?



DETERMINE YOUR NEED:

Your number of "yes" answers indicates the level of need for a medical alert service.

1. 6-9 "YES" ANSWERS

This high score indicates that there is a serious risk for a fall or other medical incident, suggesting that a medical alert service may be strongly advised.

2. 3-5 "YES" ANSWERS

This score indicates that there is a risk for a fall or other incident, suggesting that a medical alert service would be helpful and should be considered.

3. 1-2 "YES" ANSWERS

This score indicates that a medical alert service could be an important step towards maintaining independent living.

HOW THE LIFELINE SERVICE WORKS:

1. SUMMON HELP

Simply push your Lifeline Help Button at any time to connect to our 24/7 Response Center. NOTE: If you have our Lifeline with Auto Alert option, you will get an added layer of protection, as your Auto Alert Help Button will automatically place a call for help if a fall is detected and you are unable to push your button.

2. HEAR A REASSURING VOICE

A Lifeline Response Associate will access your profile and assess the situation.

3. KNOW HELP IS ON THE WAY

A Response Associate will contact a neighbor, loved one, or emergency services based on your specific needs, and will follow up to confirm that help has arrived.

Barb and I were both visiting nurses and saw how helpful Lifeline was to the patients. Medicare does not pay for this service. If you are interested in learning more about Lifeline contact one of us. Please consider this if you feel unsafe in your home due to failing. We have coupons for a discount that lasts until the end of December.

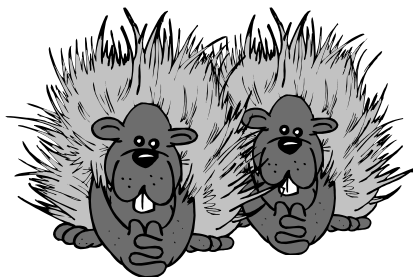
So, they had to make a choice:

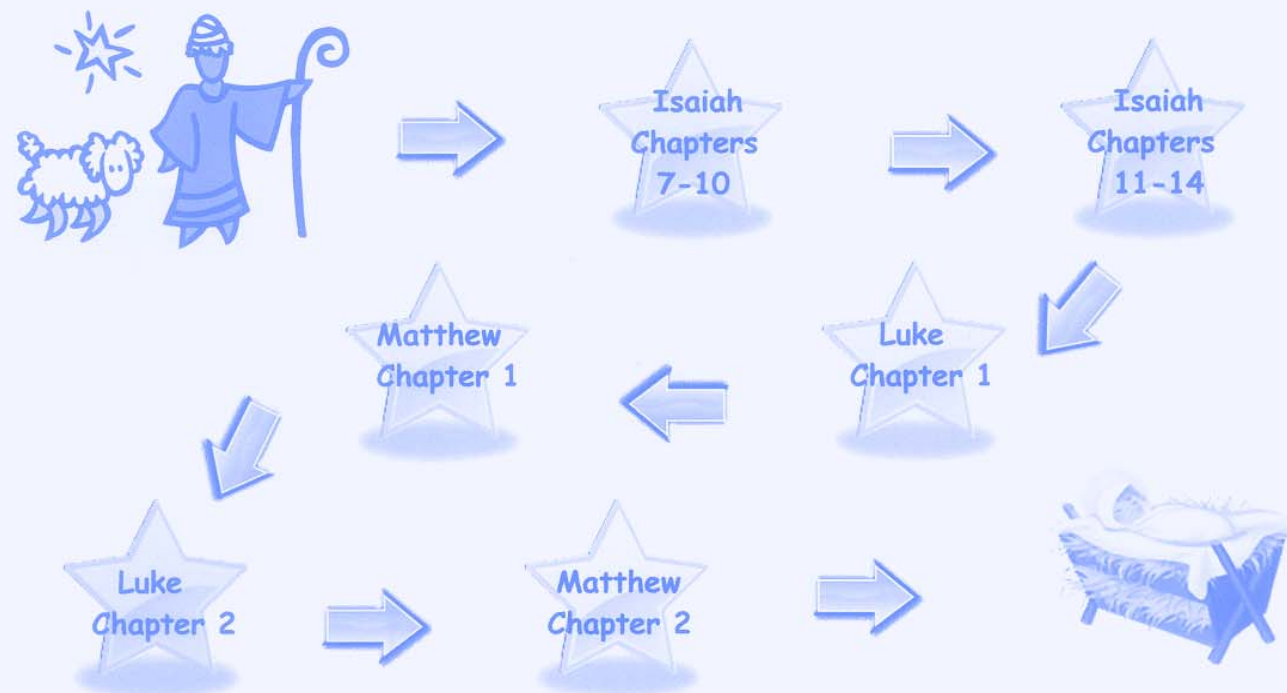

ABOUT THE CURRICULUM: JOURNEY WITH JESUS

Why do I need to travel to the whole United States?

I have two main objectives to answer this question:

1. The first answer is to fulfill the scripture in Mark16:15 "Go into all the world and preach the good news to all creation." When I was living in a Thailand Refugee camp, I read this scripture and I thought this scripture is not for me and our Karen people, because we don't have any money to travel, and we don't have any recommendation as a legal people. We have nothing, no money, no passport, and we are not a legal people. So how can we travel all the world and preach the good new to all nations?

But God is great and faithful. In Ecclesiastes 3:11 "He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the hearts of men, yet they can't fathom what God has done from beginning to end."

For over 19 years in Thailand as a refugee, I felt hopeless. We can't go back to Burma, and we didn't know how long we could stay in Thailand, because Thailand is not our country. I remember when I was a little boy I use to sing a song that said "God will make a way when there seems to be no way. He will make a way." Today I do believe that God made the way for me and for our Karen people to go all over the world to preach the good new to all nations. Now God separates our Karen people over the whole United States and the whole world. That's why I have to travel to the whole United States and later I believe - to the whole world.

2. The second thing is to organize the Karen churches in the United States. Now we are organizing K.B.C.USA which means Karen Baptist Churches in USA. I travel to state by state and to place to place representing a Karen committee; to find a Karen pastor to be able to worship in Karen language. Because even if they go to an American church they don't understand what the pastor is preaching. In some of the places, they don't have a place to worship God. They have to worship in their apartments. They face many problems with parking and their children run across the streets. They have to worry about their neighbors. We tried to find for them a place to be able to worship the Lord and also to connect them with the American Baptist Church.
